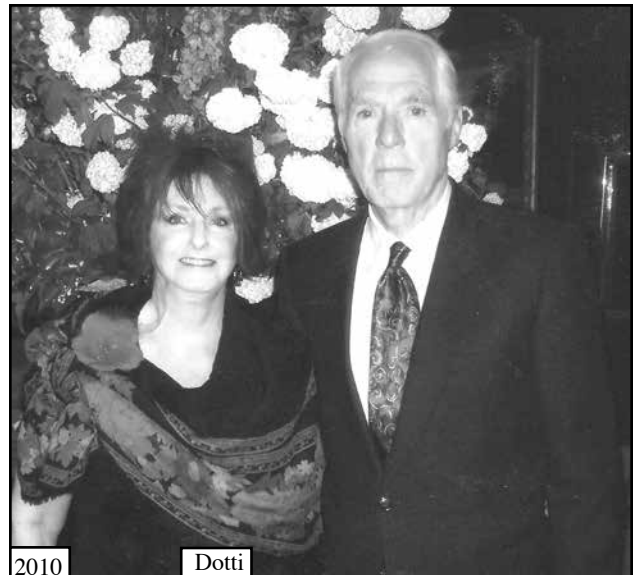

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Summary of Significant Career Events

- (1) 19 May, 1967. VF-24, Air Wing 21, USS *Bon Homme Richard*. Downed a MIG-17 over Hanoi with a Sidewinder after using Zuni rockets for flak suppression. Mission was the first attack on the Hanoi thermal power plant with Walleye weapons.
- (2) 1970, VA-174 Operations Officer, established Defensive Combat Maneuvering training in the syllabus for replacement pilots. Better prepared Junior pilots for combat and practically solved the out of controlled flight problem for the East Coast A7 squadrons.
- (3) 1974, Executive Officer VA-147, Air Wing NINE, USS *Constellation*, won Air Wing NINE carrier landing competition.
- (4) 1975-76, Commanding Officer VA-147, squadron won the Air Wing NINE bombing competition, and the LATWINGPAC bombing competition.
- (5) 1976-77, Assistant Air Boss, USS *Franklin D. Roosevelt*, helped introduce the Marine AV8 to carrier operations during Mediterranean cruise.
- (6) 1978, Commander Air Wing NINE, extended Air Wing training at NAS Fallon to include night strike training.
- (7) October 1981, NAS Cecil Field, won first LATWING-ONE Junior-Senior bombing derby.
- (8) 1986, Chief of Staff, Commander Sixth Fleet, participated in planning and execution of Libya Raid. Insisted any target list from Sixth Fleet Staff would include Khadafy's residence. The last JCS approved list included his home.
- (9) 1987-88, Commander Fleet Air Western Pacific, NAS Atsugi, ended the Mi-Cruise Corrosion Control Inspection for deployed Air Wings. Initiated negotiations with the Government of Japan for use of Iwo Jima for field carrier landing practice for Air Wing FIVE based at Atsugi. This dramatically reduced jet noise in the Atsugi area and improved relations with the Japanese people. Also improved the quality of training.
